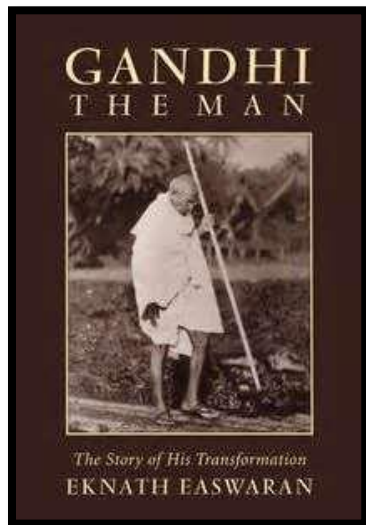
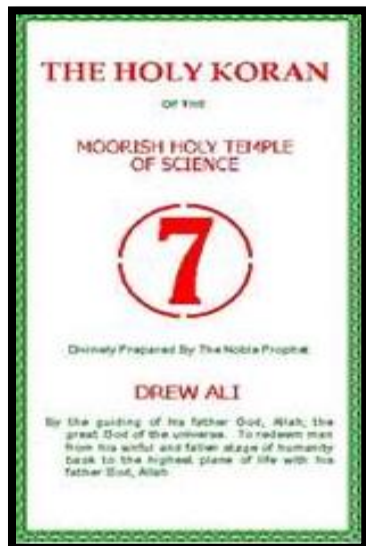

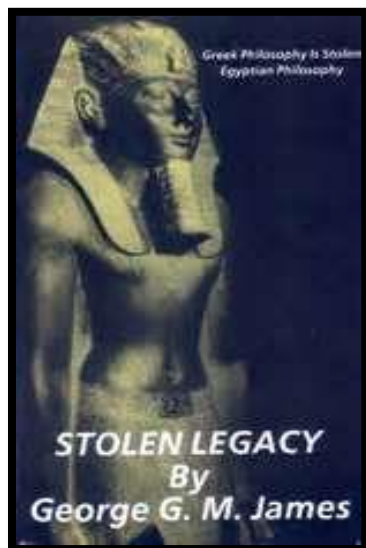
Gandhi The man By Eknath Easwaran (Jan.) *

Holy Koran Circle 7 By Prophet Noble Drew Ali (Jan.)

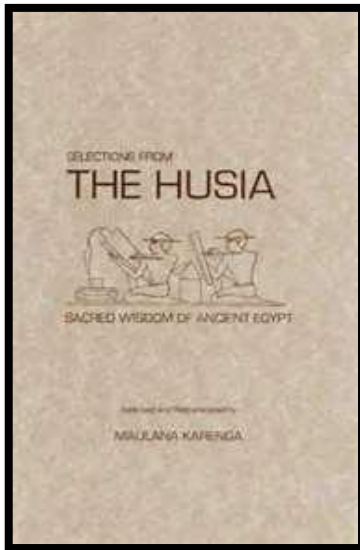

Stolen Legacy By George G.M. James (Feb.) *

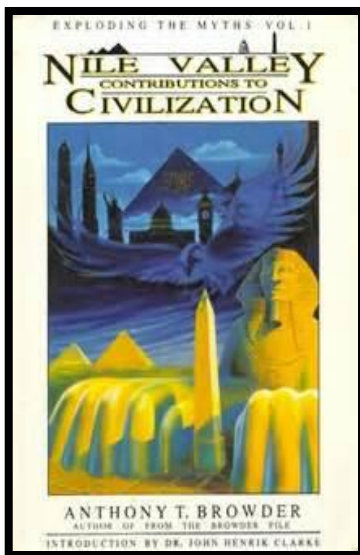

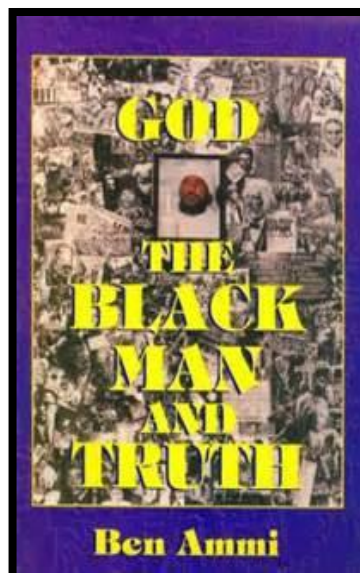
The Husia (Sacred Egyptian Writings) By Maulana Karenga (Feb.)

Nile Valley Civilization By Anthony Browder (Feb.) *

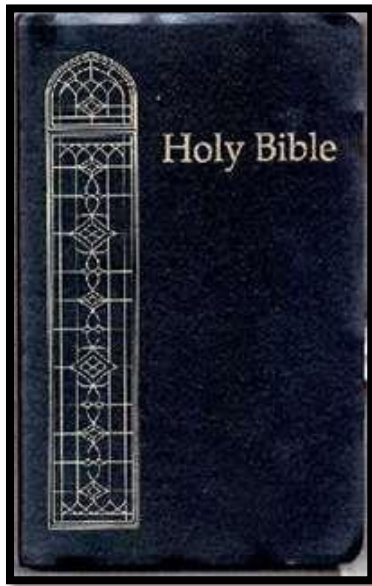

God, The Blackman, And Truth by Ben Ammi (March – April) *

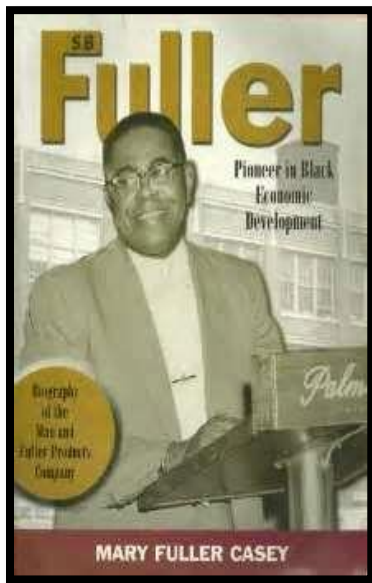

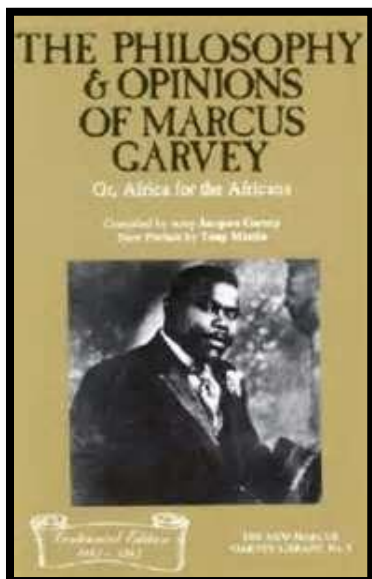

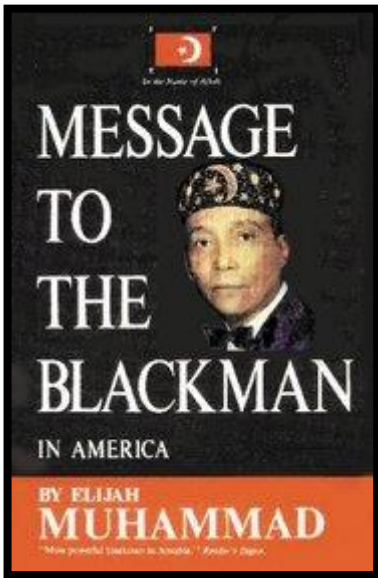
S.B. Fuller is a book that shows how persistence and determination can bring success.



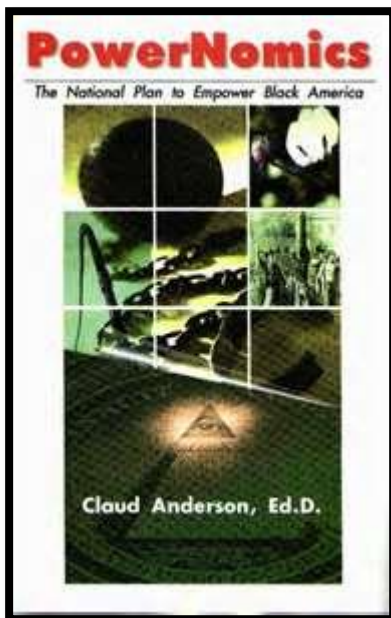
The Philosophy and Opinions Of Marcus Garvey (Aug.) *

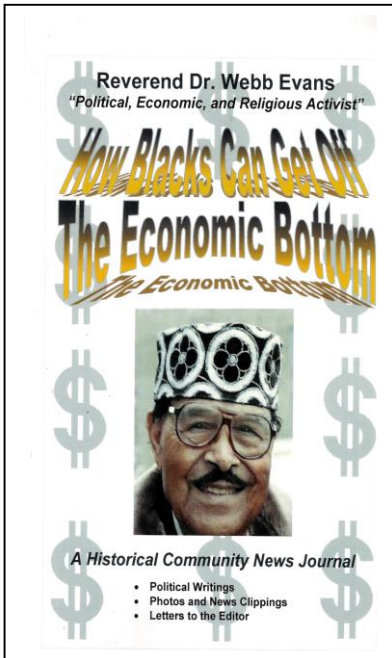
